The following is a list of Homeland Security and emergency preparedness courses presently scheduled during the fall semester at the college. Courses will meet in the Workforce Development and Construction Management Building (Building H), unless noted otherwise. All courses are provided free!

Course Name	Description	# Hours	Dates & Time
AWR-160	This is a 7 hour course, which provides training to emergency responders with awareness-level education on recognition, avoidance, isolation, and notification techniques in a WMD/Haz-mat environment. The course covers prevention and deterrence and chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosive (CBRNE) hazards. This course is highly recommended for police, fire, EMT, public utility workers and first responders. This course also provides details on Haz-mat decontamination and mass casualty triage.	7	September 19, 2009 Bush Fire Department 8am-3pm  October 3, 2009 Bldg H-rm127 8am-3pm
ICS-700	This is an 8 hour course and provides an introduction to the National Incident Management System and basic Incident Command. Highly recommended for the general public, responders and those persons who serve some capacity on an emergency response team.	8	October 14, 2009 Bldg H-rm128 8am-4pm
ICS-100	This is an 8 hour course and provides an Introduction to the Incident Command System In this course several applications for ICS will be discussed to include the major functions and responsibilities of Incident Command staff. Also, ICS organizational units, span of control and major incident facilities and Incident Action Plans will all be discussed and explained in detail. This course is recommended for all responders (police, fire, medical, public officials and employees, utility workers, etc.), students of responder occupations, those who serves on a emergency response teams and for anyone who wants to learn excellent management techniques or simply want to know how an emergency is responded to would gain from participation in this course.	8	October 15, 2009 Bldg H-rm128 8am-4pm
ICS-200	This is a 14 hour course which provides more advance principles and information concerning the Incident Command System (ICS), National Incident Management System (NIMS) and NIMS compliance. Topics discussed include leadership principles and resource information. This course is considered an intermediate ICS course, ICS-700 and 100 are recommended although not required before taking this course. This course is recommended for all responders (police, fire, medical, public officials and employees, utility workers, educators etc.), students of responder occupations, those who serves on a emergency response teams and for anyone who wants to learn excellent management techniques or simply want to know how an emergency is responded to would gain from taking this course.	14	October 20&21,2009 **Bldg F-rm119 8am-4pm

<p><b>Business Disaster/ Emergency Management and Continuity Planning</b></p>	<p>This course is a 12.5 hour course which is primarily developed for the Business Community; however, the principles taught could be used by almost anyone who needs to have an emergency plan. This course provides an in-depth outline of information which would allow a business to better prepare for a disaster and other incidents which could disrupt the normal day-to-day business operation. An investment in planning today will not only help protect your business investment and your livelihood, but will also support your employees, customers, stakeholders and the community, the local economy and even the country. The course will provides methods of identifying essential functions, risks, mitigation factors, response and recovery. The primary goal of this course is to share information which will support a businesses ability to plan for a disaster, mitigate risks and get the business back into operation as soon as possible. Everyday a business is closed after a disaster or emergency is a day of revenue lost which can serious affect the long term success of a company, employee livelihood, community stakeholders, etc. This course although not a cure all for every emergency will help business owners to speed up their recovery. This course is recommended for all types of businesses, large or small, private, public and non-profit. If you want to plan ahead and improve your readiness this course is for you.</p>	<p>12.5</p>	<p><b>November 17&amp;18, 2009</b>  <b>Bldg H-rm128</b>  <b>8am-4pm</b></p>
<p><b>ICS-300</b></p>	<p>ICS-300 is considered advance Incident Management System training. ICS-300 is a 16 hour class. As a prerequisite ICS-700, 100 and 200 must be completed. Each Command and General Staff position is explained in terms of principal responsibilities and importance to the organization. Guidelines for activation of the Command and General Staff positions and the role of deputies and assistants are also discussed. Duties are covered for each Command Staff member and for Agency Representatives. The concept of Unified Command, Area Command will be discussed and all participants will participate in mock drills or scenarios playing different roles within the command structure. This course is recommended to anyone who is considered a supervisor, manager, CEO, responders and those persons who serve on an emergency response team especially those who serve as incident commander, command staff or general ICS staff positions. Those interested in taking this course must pre-register with John A. Logan and provide evidence that the prerequisites have been completed.</p>	<p>16</p>	<p><b>December 1&amp;2, 2009</b>  <b>Bldg H-rm128</b>  <b>8am-4pm</b></p>

<p><b>ICS-400</b></p>	<p>ICS-400 is a 14 hour course and is considered as an advanced Incident Command course. As a prerequisite ICS-700, 100, 200 and 300 must be completed. The target audience for this course is senior personnel who are expected to perform in a management capacity in an Area Command or Multiagency Coordination Entry. This course expands upon information covered in the ICS-100 through ICS-300 courses. The target audience for this course is senior personnel who are expected to perform in a management capacity in an Area Command or Multi-agency Coordination Entity. This course provides training on and resources for personnel who require advanced application of the Incident Command System (ICS). This course will include but not be limited to: major and/or complex incident/event management, area command, and multi-agency coordination. This course is designed to provide overall management skills rather than tactical expertise. Those interested in taking this course must pre-register with John A.
