Tuition and Fees

The eight-week class begins at the start of each semester; a second eight-week class begins at the mid-term of each semester.

The classes meet from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. four days each week and are held on the John A. Logan College campus. Clinicals are held off-campus.

Tuition and fees for this course are approximately \$476. The textbook required for the course costs approximately \$60.

A fee of \$50 for the State Certification Test must be paid by the third week of training. A processing fee of \$15 (money order payable to SIUC) must be paid on the first day of class for the required Illinois Criminal Background Check.

NURSING ASSISTANT PROGRAM

The Nursing Assistant Program at John A. Logan College is designed to prepare the student to provide basic nursing care in a variety of settings. These settings include long-term care facilities, hospitals, home care settings, physicians' offices, and clinics.

This program is approved by the Illinois Department of Health. The student who successfully completes this intensive eight-week course is eligible to take the required Nurse Aide Competency Examination in order to be placed on the Illinois Nurse Aide Registry.

Admission Requirements

In order to enter this program, the student must meet these requirements:

1. Be at least 16 years of age.
2. Complete the pre-entrance testing (minimum ASSET reading test score of 28 or Compass reading score of 30).
3. Fulfill admission requirements for John A. Logan College.

Students are selected on a first-come, first-served basis.

OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this training program and passing the Nurse Aide competency Exam, the student will be listed on the Illinois Nurse Aide Registry as a certified nursing assistant and as such will be able to do the following:

1. Perform quality nursing care under the direct supervision of a licensed nurse or physician, including bathing, shaving, grooming, toileting, and feeding patients.
2. Accurately measure vital signs, height, and weight.
3. Promote and maintain medical asepsis and a safe environment for one's self and the patient.
4. Communicate effectively with patients, family, and members of the health care team.
5. Describe basic human anatomy and disease entities affecting different body systems.
6. Identify the principles of rehabilitation and demonstrate proper techniques of caring for a patient in a restorative nursing program.

Curriculum

This course is designed for students interested in becoming nursing assistants. Students receive training that will enable them to work in hospitals, long-term care facilities, or other health care facilities. A criminal background check is completed as a part of the program.

This program is approved by the Illinois Department of Public Health.

To successfully complete this course, the student must be in good health and without any medical or physical restrictions. This is necessary because of the required skills that must be learned and demonstrated in clinical and lab settings. The student is required to present proof of a current TB skin test or screening and may be required to provide a medical release from a physician.

AREAS OF STUDY IN THIS PROGRAM

1. Orientation to health care.
2. Introduction to the patient.
3. Medical asepsis.
4. Safety.
5. The patient's unit.
6. Lifting, moving, and transporting the patient.
7. Personal care of the patient.
8. Nutrition.
9. Fluid balance.
10. Basic anatomy and physiology.
11. Observing and recording vital signs.
12. Supportive care.
13. Fundamentals of rehabilitation.
14. Patient admission, transfer, and discharge.
15. Care of the patient in isolation.
16. Care of the Alzheimer's patient.
17. Care of the terminally ill patient and post-mortem care.
18. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation.
