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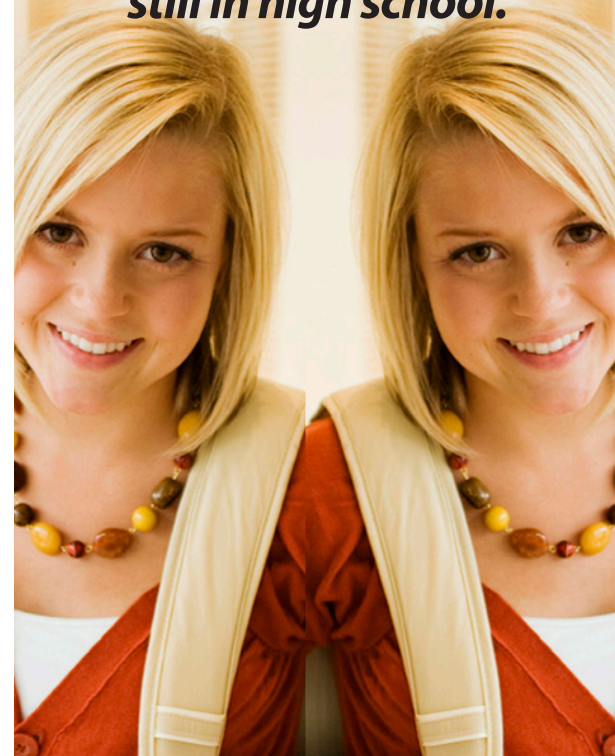

Dual Credit & Dual Enrollment For High School Students

Get a head start on your college education!

Earn college credit while still in high school.

DUAL CREDIT/DUAL ENROLLMENT

Students accepted for enrollment in college-level courses must have appropriate academic qualifications as determined by their high school, a high level of motivation and adequate time to devote to studying a college-level course.

What is Dual Credit? A high school student enrolled in a college credit class, who receives both college credit and high school credit for that class. These are almost exclusively on the high school campus.

What is Dual Enrollment? A high school student enrolled in a college course for credit while still enrolled as a high school student. College credit is obtained and credit is not awarded for any required high school course. The student is enrolled in college for some courses, while still enrolled at their home high school.

Did you know ...

A typical three semester hour course at John A. Logan College is about \$228. Tuition is free for students enrolled in a dual credit course at their high school. The College waives tuition for students enrolled in a regular college course. This may be subject to change and students should always check the dual credit/dual enrollment homepage for current information. Students are responsible for all course fees.

Dual credit and dual enrollment classes are ordinarily restricted to junior and senior years of high school and is not applicable for developmental, adult secondary education, or continuing education classes. It is also not available during summer school.

COURSES THAT ARE COVERED:

Dual Credit Classes

Each individual high school determines which courses are articulated for dual credit. Articulated courses are those in which the high school and the College have joined into an agreement to offer both high school and college credit. Students should visit their high school guidance counselor to find out which courses are articulated at their school. Dual credit classes may be taught at the high school by a qualified teacher (who is also a faculty member of JALC); taught at the high school by a college instructor, or taught at the college by college faculty.

Dual Enrollment Classes

These classes include regular college classes offered on campus and at off-campus centers. They may be held on the College's main campus, at the DuQuoin and West Frankfort Extension Centers, on-line, and at other approved College sites.

Admissions Requirements

Students enrolling in college-level courses must take the College's entrance exam or have their ACT scores on file, and complete all course prerequisites, when applicable, to ensure they have the same qualifications and preparation as other college students. Course selections should always be made in consultation with your high school guidance counselor.

Why earn college credit now?

You can get a jump start on your college education and also save on college tuition costs.

What does it cost?

Students enrolled at one of the eleven high schools in the College district do not pay tuition for approved courses taken during the fall and spring semesters (summer classes are not eligible). Students are responsible for all course fees.

Who can take classes?

High school juniors and seniors who are enrolled at one of the eleven high schools in the College district and private school students who reside in the College district, and who have the consent of their high school guidance counselor or principal. Home school students who have the permission of their parent administrator may also enroll through this program.
