Policy on Admission

To be eligible for admission, students must have graduated from an accredited high school or attained the equivalent educational level as determined by the College. Students seeking admission to the College's Baccalaureate Transfer Division must satisfy high school course pattern requirements as well as meet provisions of standardized tests. Enrollees in the College's Career Division must also meet provisions of standardized tests. Nongraduates may apply for admission if scholastic records, test scores, and other data indicate to the satisfaction of the College that the student will be able to do college-level work. Satisfactory completion of the General Educational Development test may be accepted in lieu of a high school diploma. All new students are expected to take counseling and placement examinations as advised by the Office of Admissions. Counselors will use the results to advise, recommend, and, in certain cases. require students to enroll in particular courses or programs of study.

All students must provide transcripts of high school work and transcripts of credits earned at other colleges or universities.
